


Potatoes

Spring (March 1 – May 31)

Planting the corn seed begins in the spring, around early May



Summer (June 1 – August 31)

- By the end of June planting is complete
- Around August 1st we start harvesting the corn from the field



Fall (September 1 – November 30)

Corn harvest continues well into October



Winter (December 1 – February 28)

• Canning sweet corn during the summer and fall seasons allows us to enjoy it all year long!

How is sweet corn processed?

• Production for sweet corn ramps up by late July with all Seneca locations running by early August.





• Eight strategically located facilities throughout the Midwest process sweet corn to ensure field to fork freshness.
